



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION  
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Michael Landsman, the appellant, by attorney Robert Rosenfeld, of Robert H. Rosenfeld and Associates, LLC in Chicago; and the Lake County Board of Review.<sup>1</sup>

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **No Change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

**LAND:** \$128,392  
**IMPR.:** \$231,590  
**TOTAL:** \$359,982

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

**Statement of Jurisdiction**

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2021 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

**Findings of Fact**

The subject property consists of a 2-story dwelling of wood siding exterior construction with 4,166 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 2006 and is approximately 15 years old. Features of the home include a basement with finished area, central air conditioning, one fireplace, an inground swimming pool, a 640 square foot bath house and a 484 square foot garage.<sup>2</sup> The property has an approximately 18,310 square foot site and is located in Highland Park, Moraine Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends assessment inequity, with respect to the improvement assessment, as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument, the appellant submitted information on four equity comparables located in the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject. The comparables are improved with 1.5-story or 2-story dwellings of stucco, Dryvit or wood siding exterior construction that range in size from 3,783 to 4,775 square feet of living area. The homes range in age from 20 to 31 years old. Three comparables have a basement, two with finished area and one comparable has a crawl space foundation. The homes have central air conditioning, one or two fireplaces and a garage ranging in size from 462 to 817 square feet of building area. The comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$157,725 to \$237,344 or from \$33.03 to \$50.47 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested the subject's improvement assessment be reduced to \$170,806 or \$41.00 per square foot of living area.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$359,982. The subject has an improvement assessment of \$231,590 or \$55.59 per square foot of living area. In support of its contention of the correct assessment, the board of review submitted information on five equity comparables located in the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject property. Board of review comparable #3 is the same property as the appellant's comparable #4. The comparables are improved with 2-story dwellings of brick, stucco, Dryvit or wood siding exterior construction that range in size from 4,196 to 4,831 square feet of living area. The homes were built from 1995 to 2007. Each comparable has a basement with finished area, central air conditioning, one or two fireplaces and a garage ranging in size from 592 to 726 square feet of building area. The comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$237,344 to \$349,399 or from \$50.47 to \$81.20 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested the subject's assessment be confirmed.

### **Conclusion of Law**

The appellant contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments, for the assessment year in question, of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The record contains eight equity comparables for the Board's consideration, as one property was common to both parties. The Board gives less weight to the appellant's comparables #1, #3 and #4 along with board of review comparables #2 and #3, including the common property, as these properties differ from the subject in foundation type, dwelling size and/or age when compared to the subject and other comparables in the record.

The Board finds the best evidence of assessment equity to be appellant comparable #2 and board of review comparables #1, #4 and #5 which are more similar to the subject in location age, design, dwelling size and other features, although none of these best comparables has an

inground swimming pool or bath house like the subject property. These comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$168,334 to \$340,735 or from \$35.89 to \$81.20 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$231,590 or \$55.59 per square foot of living area falls within the range established by the best comparables in this record. After considering appropriate adjustments to the best comparables for differences from the subject, the Board finds the appellant did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

**IMPORTANT NOTICE**

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
