

PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD'S DECISION

APPELLANT: Albert Bruno

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board (PTAB) are Albert Bruno, the appellant, by attorney Joseph G. Kusper of Storino, Ramello & Durkin of Rosemont and the Cook County Board of Review (board).

The subject property consists of a 31-year-old, two-story, class 2-78 dwelling of masonry construction containing 2,075 square feet of living area and located in Leyden Township, Cook County. The residence includes one and one half bathrooms, no basement, air conditioning and a two-car garage.

The appellant, through counsel, submitted evidence before the PTAB claiming unequal treatment in the assessment process as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument, the appellant offered three suggested comparable properties located within a half mile of the subject. These properties consist of two-story or one and part two-story, class 2-04 or two-story class 2-78 dwellings of frame construction, and range in age from 56 to 113 years. The comparables include one or three bathrooms, one with a half bath and two with full basements. The comparables have one or two-car garages. The comparables contain between 2,190 and 2,989 square feet of living area and have improvement assessments ranging from \$18,608 to \$24,950 or from \$8.35 to \$8.50 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested a reduction in the subject's improvement assessment.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" wherein the subject's final improvement assessment of \$25,121, or \$12.15 per square foot of living area, was disclosed. In support of the subject's assessment, the board of review offered three suggested comparable class 2-78 properties located within a quarter mile of the subject. The comparables consist of two-story dwellings of masonry construction. The comparables range in age from four to 50 years and they have full basements. The comparables have two bathrooms with some half baths; two have air conditioning, one with a fireplace and all properties have

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Based on the facts and exhibits presented, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds no change in the assessment of the property as established by the Cook County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

two-car garages. The comparable properties contain between 2,125 and 2,411 square feet of living area with improvement assessments of between \$27,093 and \$34,589 or from \$12.75 to \$15.02 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject property's assessment.

After reviewing the record and considering the evidence, the Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of this appeal. The appellant's argument was unequal treatment in the assessment process. The Illinois Supreme Court has held that taxpayers who object to an assessment on the basis of lack of uniformity bear the burden of proving the disparity of assessment valuations by clear and convincing evidence. Kankakee County Board of Review v. Property Tax Appeal Board, 131 Ill.2d 1 (1989). The evidence must demonstrate a consistent pattern of assessment inequities within the assessment jurisdiction. After an analysis of the assessment data, the Board finds the appellant has failed to overcome this burden.

The PTAB finds the board's comparables one and three are the only comparable similar to the subject but with some differences in age and living area to be considered. These two properties have improvement assessments of \$12.75 and \$15.02 per square foot of living area. The subject's per square foot improvement assessment of \$12.15 is a lower assessment than these similar properties. The PTAB gives less weight to the remaining four comparables because they are less similar to the subject in age or living area or construction materials or building classification. After considering the differences in both parties' suggested comparables when compared to the subject property, the PTAB finds the evidence of one similar property is insufficient evidence to effect a change in the subject's assessment.

As a result of this analysis, the PTAB finds the appellant did not adequately demonstrate that the subject property was inequitably assessed by clear and convincing evidence and a reduction is not warranted.

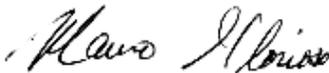

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing

complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for the subsequent year directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
