



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION  
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

APPELLANT: Michael Arrington

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Michael Arrington, the appellant, by attorney Edwin M. Wittenstein of Worssek & Vihon in Chicago; and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds no change in the assessment of the property as established by the Cook County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

**LAND:** \$34,860  
**IMPR:** \$181,421  
**TOTAL:** \$216,281

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

**ANALYSIS**

The subject property is improved with a two-story dwelling of masonry construction containing 4,571 square feet of living area. The dwelling is 71 years old. Features of the home include a full basement finished with a recreation room, central air conditioning, a fireplace and a 2-car garage.

The appellant's appeal is based on unequal treatment in the assessment process. The appellant submitted information on nine comparable properties, one of which is in the same neighborhood code as the subject, and which were described as two-story, masonry dwellings that range in age from 66 to 109 years old. The comparable dwellings range in size from 3,839 to 4,860 square feet of living area. Eight comparables have a full basement of which three basements are finished with a recreation room and one comparable has a partial basement finished with a recreation room. Each comparable has central air conditioning. Seven comparables have a fireplace and two comparables have two fireplaces. Five comparables have 2-car garages, two comparables have 2.5-car garages and one comparable has a 3-car garage. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$20.07 to \$29.89 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment is \$39.69 per square foot of living area. Based on

this evidence, the appellant requested a reduction in the subject's improvement assessment.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" wherein the subject's final assessment was disclosed. The board of review presented descriptions and assessment information on three comparable properties in the subject's same neighborhood code consisting of two-story stucco or masonry dwellings that range in age from 79 to 97 years old. The dwellings range in size from 3,959 to 4,810 square feet of living area. Each comparable has a full basement of which one basement is finished with a recreation room. Two comparables have central air conditioning. Two comparables have two fireplaces and one comparable has a single fireplace. Two comparables have 2-car garages and one comparable has a 1.5-car garage. These properties have improvement assessments ranging from \$39.11 to \$45.22 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

After reviewing the record and considering the evidence, the Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of this appeal. The Board further finds a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The appellant contends unequal treatment in the subject's improvement assessment as the basis of the appeal. Taxpayers who object to an assessment on the basis of lack of uniformity bear the burden of proving the disparity of assessment valuations by clear and convincing evidence. Kankakee County Board of Review v. Property Tax Appeal Board, 131 Ill.2d 1 (1989). After an analysis of the assessment data, the Board finds the appellant has not met this burden.

The Board finds the comparables submitted by the board of review were most similar to the subject in location, size, and age. Due to their similarities to the subject, these comparables received the most weight in the Board's analysis. These comparables had improvement assessments that ranged from \$39.11 to \$45.22 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$39.69 per square foot of living area is supported by the most similar comparables. After considering adjustments and the differences in both parties' comparables when compared to the subject, the Board finds the subject's improvement assessment is equitable and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code.

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing

complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for the subsequent year directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
