



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

APPELLANT: Tony Giannini

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Tony Giannini, the appellant, by attorney Scott Shudnow, of Shudnow & Shudnow, Ltd. in Chicago; and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds a reduction in the assessment of the property as established by the Cook County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$ 17,688
IMPR.: \$ 37,532
TOTAL: \$ 55,220

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

ANALYSIS

The subject property consists of a 6,700 square foot parcel improved with a 64-year-old, 2,408 square foot, two-story, single-family dwelling of frame and masonry construction located in New Trier Township, Cook County. Features of the residence include two and one-half bathrooms, a partial-finished basement, central air-conditioning, two fireplaces and a two and one-half car detached garage.

The appellant, through counsel, submitted evidence before the Property Tax Appeal Board claiming the subject's market value is not accurately reflected in its assessment. In support of this claim, the appellant submitted a uniform residential appraisal report prepared by Dione N. Spiteri of DNS & Associates, Inc. in Chicago, Illinois. The appraisal revealed that Spiteri is a State of Illinois certified real estate appraiser. The appraisal disclosed that Spiteri inspected the interior and exterior of the subject property. The appraiser utilized the sales comparison approach as well as the cost approach to estimate a market value of \$550,000 for the subject as of January 1, 2007.

In the sales comparison approach to value, the appraiser employed the sales of three properties located within 1.35 miles of the subject. The comparables consist of two-story, single-family dwellings of masonry or frame and masonry construction ranging from 51 to 86 years in age. The lots range in size from 7,000 to 13,407 square feet and the improvements range in size from 2,016 to 2,344 square feet of living area. The comparables sold between February 2006 and June 2006 for prices ranging from \$535,000 to \$560,000 or from \$238.91 to \$265.38 per square foot of living area, including land. After making adjustments, the appraiser concluded a value for the subject via the sales comparison approach of \$550,000.

In the cost approach, the appraiser estimated the value of the subject site to be \$250,000. The appraiser then estimated a replacement cost new for the subject of \$288,058. Accrued depreciation was estimated to be \$7,604 and deducted from the estimated replacement cost. A cost of \$25,000 for other site improvements was added to the depreciated cost of the main improvement, as was the land value of \$250,000. Thus, the appraiser determined a value for the subject via the cost approach of \$555,454.

In reconciling the two approaches to value, the appellant's appraiser indicated the most weight was accorded the sales comparison approach with the cost approach used in support. Based on the evidence submitted, the appellant requested an assessment reflective of a fair market value for the subject of \$550,000.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" wherein the subject's final assessment of \$74,472 was disclosed. The assessment reflects a total market value of \$741,752 for the subject, when the 2007 Illinois Department of Revenue's three-year median level of assessments of 10.04% for Class 2 property, such as the subject, is applied. In support of the assessment the board submitted property characteristic printouts and descriptive data on four properties suggested as comparable to the subject. The suggested comparables are improved with two-story, single-family dwellings of frame and masonry construction with the same neighborhood code as the subject. The improvements range in size from 1,872 to 2,163 square feet of living area and range in age from 68 to 72 years old. The comparables contain from one and one-half to three full bathrooms, a full-finished or unfinished basement, central air-conditioning, two fireplaces and a one-car or two-car garage. The improvement assessments range from \$28.18 to \$32.09 per square foot of living area. The board's evidence disclosed that the board of review's comparable one sold in January 2005 for \$820,000. Based on the evidence presented, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

In rebuttal, the appellant's attorney submitted a two-page brief arguing that the board of review's evidence fails to address the appellant's market value argument.

After reviewing the record and considering the evidence, the Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of this appeal.

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. National City Bank of Michigan/Illinois v. Illinois Property Tax Appeal Board, 331 Ill.App.3d 1038 (3rd Dist, 2002); Winnebago County Board of Review v. Property Tax Appeal Board, 313 Ill.App.3d 179 (2nd Dist. 2000). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal, a recent arms-length sale of the subject property, recent sales of comparable properties, or recent construction costs of the subject property. (86 Ill.Adm.Code §1910.65(c)). Having considered the evidence presented, the Board finds the appellant has satisfied this burden and a reduction is warranted.

The Property Tax Appeal Board finds the best evidence of market value in the record is the uniform residential appraisal report provided by the appellant. In addition, the Board finds the board of review did not present any evidence or argument refuting the appellant's appraisal report. Moreover, the board of review's evidence fails to address the appellant's market value argument. Thus, the Board finds the subject had a fair market value of \$550,000 as of January 1, 2007. Since fair market value has been established, the 2007 Illinois Department of Revenue's three-year median level of assessments of 10.04% for Class 2 property shall apply and a reduction is warranted.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing

complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for the subsequent year directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
