



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

APPELLANT: Bart Przyjemski

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Bart Przyjemski, the appellant, by attorney Donald L. Schramm, of Rieff Schramm Kanter & Guttman in Chicago; and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds a reduction in the assessment of the property as established by the Cook County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$ 7,649
IMPR.: \$ 37,732
TOTAL: \$ 45,381

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

ANALYSIS

The subject property is improved with a 44 year old, three-story, masonry, multi-family dwelling. It contains 5,306 square feet of living area and is situated on a 5,625 square foot lot. Features include six full baths and twelve bedrooms. The appellant argued that the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed value.

In support of this overvaluation argument, the appellant submitted a copy of a settlement statement indicating that subject sold in August 2007 for \$452,000. This form indicates that a realtor was involved in this transaction and that an owner's policy for title insurance was issued for the amount of the purchase price. Additionally, the appellant's petition indicates that this was not a transfer between related parties. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested the subject's assessment be reduced to reflect the subject's purchase price.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" wherein the subject's assessment of \$70,168 was

disclosed. In support of the subject's assessment, the board of review submitted descriptive and assessment data relating to four suggested comparables located within close proximity to the subject. The properties are improved with a three-story, masonry, multi-family dwelling. They range: in age from 33 to 47 years; in size from 4,731 to 5,331 square feet of living area; and in improvement assessment from \$11.59 to \$12.43 per square foot. Amenities for the comparables include three and two half to six full baths, six to twelve bedrooms, a full or partial finished or unfinished basement for three comparables, and a three-car garage for one comparable. As a result of this analysis, the board requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

After reviewing the record and considering the evidence, the Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of this appeal. The Board further finds the evidence in the record supports a reduction in the subject's assessment.

When overvaluation is claimed the appellant has the burden of proving the value of the property by a preponderance of the evidence. National City Bank of Michigan/Illinois v. Illinois Property Tax Appeal Board, 331Ill.App.3d 1038 (3rd Dist. 2002); Winnebago County Board of Review v. Property Tax Appeal Board, 313 Ill.App.3d 179 (2nd Dist. 2000). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal, a recent arm's length sale of the subject property, recent sales of comparable properties, or recent construction costs of the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code 1910.65(c). Having considered the evidence presented, the Board finds that the appellant has met the burden of demonstrating that the subject is overvalued and that a reduction is warranted.

The Board finds that the best evidence of market value was the recent purchase price of the subject property. The unrebutted evidence demonstrated that the subject sold in August 2007 for \$452,000. This was a transfer between unrelated parties and a broker's fee was paid on this transaction. The Board further finds that the county failed to proffer any evidence indicating either that this sale was not an arm's length transaction or that there were sales comparables located within the subject's area which rebutted the validity of the subject's sale price.

On the basis of this analysis, the Board finds that the subject had a fair market value of \$452,000 as of the 2007 assessment date at issue. Since fair market value has been established, the Department of Revenue median level of assessment for Cook County class 2, residential property of 10.04% for tax year 2007 shall apply to this subject property.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code.

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing

complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for the subsequent year directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
